
The Problem

5,000 to **10,000** tigers living in captivity in the United States Only **3,000** left in the wild





No federal laws designed to prohibit this

Federal Laws that Protect Big Cats

Endangered Species Act: Prohibits the interstate and foreign commerce of listed species and their parts and products without a permit or authorization from the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Prohibits killing endangered species.

Captive Wildlife Safety Act: Makes it illegal to import, export, transport, sell, receive, acquire, or purchase, in interstate or foreign commerce, live large cats (USDA license holders exempt).

Animal Welfare Act: Sets minimum care standards that address housing, handling, food, water, basic living requirements for most warm-blooded animals, including big cats, used for commercial purposes.





Patchwork of State Regulation

Types of state laws:

- Ban on private possession of big cats
- Ban on private possession of exotic big cats
- Allow private possession with a permit or license
- No law regulating or banning private possession

4 states do not regulate private possession of exotic wild animals: Alabama, Nevada, North Dakota, and Wisconsin





Enforcement

- Fines don't deter repeat violators
- Exhibitor loophole
- Complaint-based enforcement and inspection
- Agencies are understaffed
