What to include?

- Address/location
- Species and number of animals
- What you observe (Act of cruelty? Lack of shelter?)
- Any signs of animal suffering (yelping, emaciation, visible injury, listlessness)
- Take photos and video if possible







- Why Are We Talking About This?

 - ...sussing out when something might be unlawful cruelty.
 - ...being able to provide useful information.
 - ...identifying situations where you want better laws.
- Why Are We <u>Not</u> Talking About This?
 - To condense a legal education into 45 minutes.
 - To ensure you know everything about animal cruelty law.
 - To provide legal advice.





Key Issue: Disambiguating Conduct

- Conduct
 - Acts of commission
 - Acts of omission (if responsible for animal)
- Cruelty
 - Unlawful Cruelty
 - Lawful Cruelty
- Non-Cruel Conduct

Summary: This brief overview describes state laws (23 states and D.C.) that concern the tethering or chaining of dogs. It also includes a table of those state laws dealing with tethering with links to the text of the laws.

"In which states is it illegal to chain or tether your dog?"

Tethering or chaining a dog simply means that a person ties a dog with a rope, line, or chain to a stationary object. As of 2021, 23 state District of Columbia have laws on dog tethering/chaining. While the laws themselves vary from state to state, they do have seve consistent features. Some state laws allow a dog to be tethered for a reasonable period of time. California prohibits tethering a dog stationary object, but allows a dog to be tethered "no longer than is necessary for the person to complete a temporary task that rec dog to be restrained for a reasonable period." More recent laws restrict the number of hours a dog can be tethered within a 24-hou








Entertainment, Exhibitions, & Exemptions

Narrows Ability of Cruelty Law to Shield Certain Animals




Good Samaritans: Dogs in Hot Cars







Good Samaritans: Dogs in Hot cars



DOGS IN HOT CARS

- CRIME TO LEAVE AN ANIMAL UNATTENDED IF RISK OF SERIOUS INJURY/DEATH, BUT NO ONE CAN RESCUE
 - LAW ENFORCEMENT CAN BREAK IN TO RESCUE AN ANIMAL
 - STATES WITH "GOOD SAMARITAN" LAWS



Good Samaritans: Dogs in Hot cars



Criminal, civil immunity

Typical requirements:


- Have reasonable, good faith belief the animal is in imminent danger
- Call law enforcement
- Use no more force than necessary
- Remain with animal in safe location until law enforcement arrives





Good Samaritans: Entry & Intervention

- Do Not Assume Your Statutes Authorize
- If Statutes Do Cover, Typically Similar to Hot Car Laws:
 - Reasonable, good faith belief that animal faces unlawful harm;
 - Specific actions authorized by law
 - E.g. enter to provide food/water
